Branch Meeting Looks At Successful College Financial Planning

The February 10th Manhattan Branch program was presented by Jodi Kaus, the Program Director of K-State's Powercat Financial Counseling (PFC).



It is a student-driven program that provides K-State students with free assistance and counseling on personal finances, helping students become successful money managers.

PFC provides free information and education to currently enrolled K-State students seeking help with

issues such as: budgeting, credit use, saving, identity theft, managing debt, student loan management, and transitioning to work after college.

PFC began in August 2009. It is funded by student government and housed in the K-State Student Union.

In addition to the director, the staff includes two graduate assistants and 16 peer financial counselors. The

peer counselors include students studying personal financial planning, business finance, accounting, and agricultural economics.

Counselors help students review and evaluate the financial options of the cost of education such as, scholarships, grants, part-time work, work-study, gifts and loans.

The peer counselors help students create a financial plan, preferably during a student's first semester and continuing each semester with follow up sessions to monitor financial progress. This helps graduating students understand their financial situation and their education loans enabling them to transition into their careers successfully.

K-State's Powercat Financial Counseling has received recognition both locally and nationally. Secretary of Education, Arnie Duncan, has praised PFC as a financial literacy program to emulate.

AAUW Community — The Good and the Bad of the Foreign Policy 100 Leading Thinkers List

Every year *Foreign Policy* magazine produces a list of the people making a difference in the world, **the 100**



Leading Global Thinkers. The magazine's editors compile the list annually from the biggest news stories and trends. In 2013, the list actually includes 134 individuals (or organizations), and sadly, only 40 of them are women, about 30 percent. Let's take a closer look at some of the women who made a difference in the world in 2013.

The good: More than half of the 21 individuals in the advocates section are women, which demonstrates that 2013 was a year in which issues facing women and girls were at the forefront of the media.

The world was watching India as advocates protested the culture of sexual violence in the aftermath of the gang rape and murder of a 23-year-old woman on a bus in New Delhi. **Urvashi Butalia** and **Kavita Krishnan** are named for their work pressuring the Indian government for stronger action against sexual violence.

Malala Yousafzai stole our hearts in 2013 with her nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize, but kudos to Foreign Policy for naming sisters Gulalai and Saba Is-

mail to the list for their work to empower Pakistani girls through their organization, Aware Girls. We are pleased to see four American women, Mary Jennings Hegar, Zoe Bedell, Colleen Farrell, and Jennifer Hunt, round out the list. All four women served in the military on tours of duty in combat zones, and they filed a suit against the Pentagon to end the combat ban. Be sure to check out the other lady advocates: Heba Morayef, Navi Pillay, Fatou Bensouda, and Julieta Castellanos.

The bad: It's disappointing to see that even on lists like this, women are underrepresented in traditionally male-dominated fields — the categories "Innovators" and "Moguls" have just one woman in each.

Noura Al Kaabi stands out as the only woman in the moguls category for making big waves in the media

industry. Kaabi is the CEO of **twofour54**, a company working to train Arabic media talent and develop entertainment content "by Arabs for Arabs". Kaabi was also included on *Hollywood Reporter*'s list of the 25 most powerful women in global TV.

The Manhattan Branch's application for Kansas State University scholarships is available for the 2014-2015 academic year and we would like our members to spread the word to eligible women.

You may have a niece, granddaughter, neighbor, someone from your church - or for our younger members — yourself, that may be interested in our \$1,000 scholarships. We have three (3) scholarships available this year. Here are the qualifications for eligible candidates.

- \$ Female students attending Kansas State University (Manhattan, Salina, or Olathe campuses) for the 2014 2015 academic year. Students taking courses *solely* through distance education *do not* qualify.
- \$ Must be returning to school after at least a three (3) year lapse in education. Applicants may have already entered or returned to college after this time lapse.
- \$ Must have at least two (2) complete semesters of credit remaining before graduation.
- \$ Must be a Bachelor Degree candidate enrolled for a minimum of twelve (12) credit hours per semester or Graduate Degree candidate enrolled for a minimum of nine (9) credit hours per semester or six (6) credit hours per semester with a Graduate Assistantship.

Deadline for submission of all materials (application, references and transcripts) is <u>April 1, 2014</u>.
