Women's Health: Understanding the Origin of and Therapies for Breast Cancer

Dr. Annelise Nguyen, Associate Professor of Toxicology, College of Veterinary Medicine/Johnson Cancer Research Center, Kansas State University

Dr. Nguyen is a distinguished researcher with a focus on breast cancer. In collaboration with K-State researchers Dr. Duy Hua, Chemistry, and Dr. Delores Takemoto, Biochemistry, they discovered cancer-fighting synthetic compounds that prevent tumor formation in mouse models with mammary tumors. Their research has led to a patent and is used to enhance breast cancer therapies. Dr. Nguyen was born in Vietnam and immigrated with her family to the U.S. when she was ten. It was at this age that she was first enrolled in school. While academically behind her peers, she was a fast learner and excelled. She received her Ph.D. from Texas A&M in 2001.

Eight branch members attended the AAUW Midwest Conference, June 3-4 at the Great Wolf Lodge, Kansas City. The conference theme was "AAUW-Working Today for the Women of Tomorrow." Outgoing State President Nancy Bolsen was praised for her inspiring leadership in the opening session.

the importance of the organization's research, showed the new video "One AAUW: Changing the Climate for Women and Girls," and conducted a group exercise on developing AAUW "elevator speeches" for conveying the mission and importance of AAUW to potential members. A timely presentation, "Get Out the Vote" by Katie Simon, AAUW Associate Director of Field Operations stressed the importance of voting in the 2016 elections because so much is at stake that affects women and families. It is important to speak out on key issues. She stated that the lack of candidate knowledge and uncertainty about qualification were major deterrents to 75 million eligible voters two years ago. The conference ended with a Town Hall Meeting to give participants an opportunity to ask questions.

One of the largest sources of funding for graduate women, AAUW provides nearly \$4 million in funding each year to women scholars and community projects that benefit women and girls. American Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conducting postdoctoral research full time, or preparing research for publication for eight consecutive weeks.

Funding: \$6,000-30,000

Deadline: November 15

International Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time graduate or postdoctoral study in the United States who are not

U.S. citizens or permanent residents

Funding: \$18,000-\$30,000 Deadline: December 1

Career Development Grants

Who may apply: Women pursuing a certificate or degree to advance or change their careers, change careers, or reenter the workforce and whose bachelor's degree was received at least five years

before the award period. **Funding:** \$2,000–\$12,000

Selected Professions Fellowships

Who may apply: Women pursuing full-time study in a master's or professional degree program in which women are underrepresented, including STEM, law, business, and medicine

Funding: \$5,000-\$18,000
Deadline: January 10

Community Action Grants

Who may apply: Individuals, AAUW branches and states, and nonprofit organizations to fund innovative programs or nondegree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls

Funding:

One-year grant, \$2,000-\$7,000 Two-year grant, \$5,000-\$10,000

2016 Grow Green Results for Our KSU Scholarship Fund

The Greater Manhattan Community Foundation held their annual Grow Green fundraiser on April 22, 2016 for organizations that have accounts set up with them. The AAUW Scholarship Fund took in \$785.00 in donations from nine members and one non-member. This amount was matched 50% by Mr. Phil Howe, which gave us another

\$392.50 for a total earnings of \$1,177.50! Each donor was sent a thank-you note from the scholarship chair and a group thank-you packet was organized for Mr. Howe. Thanks again to everyone who donated. This is such a great opportunity to raise funds for our scholarships, especially with the generous match.

Summer STEM Institute Scholarships

Six young women received AAUW Branch Scholarships to attend the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Summer Institute at Kansas State University. The students were there for four weeks in June, Monday-Thursday from 8:30-11:30 a.m. Many STEM sessions were offered with an emphasis on hands-on and real world applications. These included computer programming, chemistry of candy, special effects in movies, Minecraft, outdoor biology, building and racing cars, solar energy, and many others. Students selected four of the classes from the offerings and had a different topic each week. USD 383 and the College of Education at KSU partnered in this endeavor. KSU education students helped the certified teachers in developing and teaching the sessions, and elementary schools provided bus transportation for students to attend. USD 383 also used grant money from the Department of Defense to support the event. Diane Daniel and the Office of Teaching and Learning at USD 383 helped with student registration.

AAUW Scholarship applications were distributed to Anthony and Eisenhower Middle Schools in February. Science, math, and technology teachers were notified about the scholarships and encouraged to get students to apply. Students that qualify for free lunch do not pay for STEM Institute tuition, and reduced lunch students pay less than the full \$100 fee. Hence, the AAUW scholarships are not need-based, but selected based on the completeness of the application, teacher signature, and the essay they write about why they want to attend STEM. This year, there were six that met the criteria, so a selection committee was not needed. They all received a scholarship!

Those selected from Eisenhower Middle School were **Crysteen Brown, Megan Stubbings, Destiny Mitchell,** and **Keely Krider. Kahla Ward** and **Maggie Morrill** were recipients from Anthony Middle School. All six enrolled and participated in the Summer STEM Institute. Parents were notified via email when their daughters were selected to receive the AAUW Scholarship. Some of their replies were:

Megan really enjoys the STEM program and will be excited to hear she won the scholarship. Thank you so much.

Thank you for your generous donation. Maggie loves STEM! Her brother had attended the first one, and every since then she could not wait until she was eligible to participate. She designed the logo and was very excited to see it again this year when she gave me the flyer, so THANK YOU!!

Public Policy Updates --- Are You Ready to Vote?

The League of Women Voters of Manhattan and Riley County will be very busy registering voters in our area. The Young Voters Project, which is a branch of LWV, is also helping with the registrations. They are having a table at the Purple Power Play activities at City Park on September 15 and 16 to get K-State students registered. The League has already registered voters during the Martin Luther King Celebration, at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Manhattan Summer Fest, the Juneteenth Celebration, and at the Everyone Counts activity. We also registered people at the Job Corp. one day. On National Registration Day, September 27, we will have registration tables at many of local businesses, Meadowlark Nursing Facility, Manhattan High School, and Manhattan Area Technical College. All of last year, we registered 324 voters, and just through July of this year we have already registered 302 voters.

With **October 18**th being the **last day to register** for the General Election and **November 8**th being the **General Election**, members should take the opportunity to hear about the candidates

running for offices. The League is sponsoring a Candidate Forum at the College Avenue United Methodist Church on Saturday, September 10th from 9:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. You will have a chance to rotate around tables and ask questions of each of the candidates for the USD 383 Board of Education or the Riley County Commission or the Manhattan City Commission.
